## Programme Facts



The European Union promotes cooperation between regions and countries through the **European Territorial Cooperation (ETC)**



In the framework of ETC in the 2021-2027 perspective, there are almost 100 **Interreg Programmes**, out of which 10 Interreg **IPA** Programmes



The Interreg VI-A IPA Programme **Croatia - Serbia** belongs to the cross-border strand (A) of Interreg and is supported by ERDF/IPA III funds



The new Interreg Programme (2021-2027) was **approved by the European Commission on 3 Nov 2022** and continues the successful cooperation of the two countries in 2014-2020

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**Total Programme Allocation: EUR 45.037.241,00**

Including 10% flat rate for Technical assistance

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**85% of EU funding: EUR 38.281.653,00**

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**15% of national co-financing: EUR 6.755.588,00**

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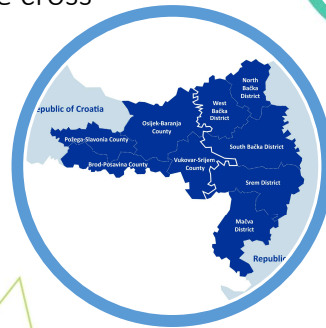
**Total EU funding available for projects: EUR 34.801.503,00**



# Main Programme Goals

Strategic Programme objective is the sustainable development of the Programme area through **smart, green and innovative** projects.

Based on **lessons learnt in the 2014-2020 period**, the Programme will continue to tackle joint challenges, by providing resources and building the capacities of stakeholders to develop new solutions benefiting the cross-border region.



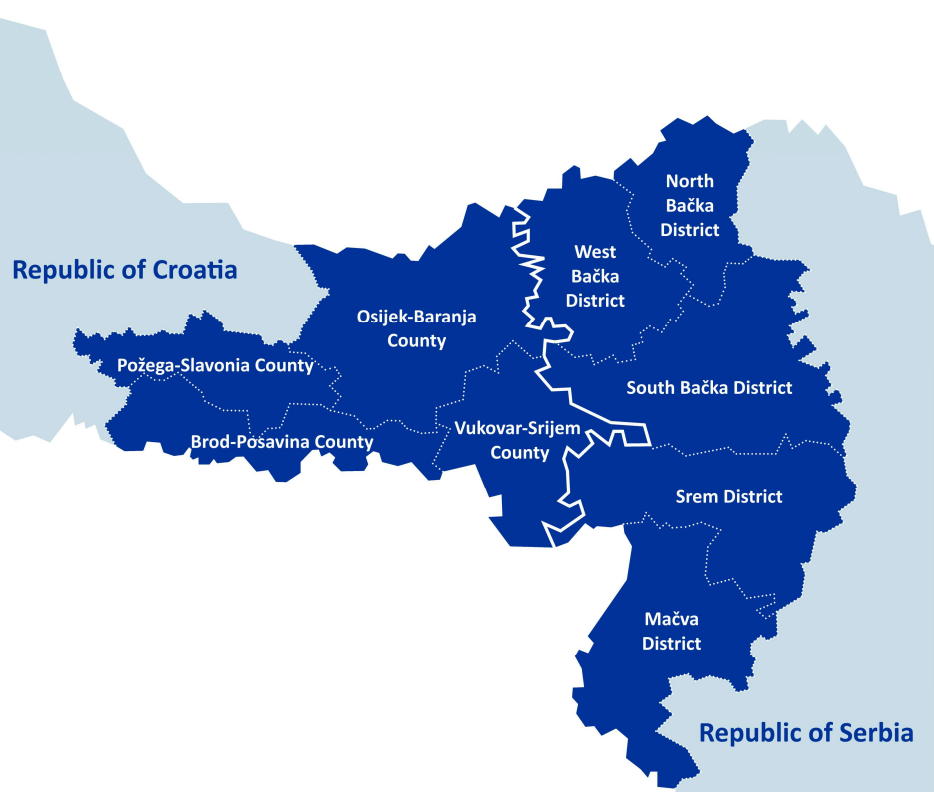
The **Programme mission**, beside strengthening the social, economic and territorial development of the cross-border area, is to encourage and support cross-border cooperation to make the area more resilient to common challenges.

- Includes the following regions in the cross-border area:

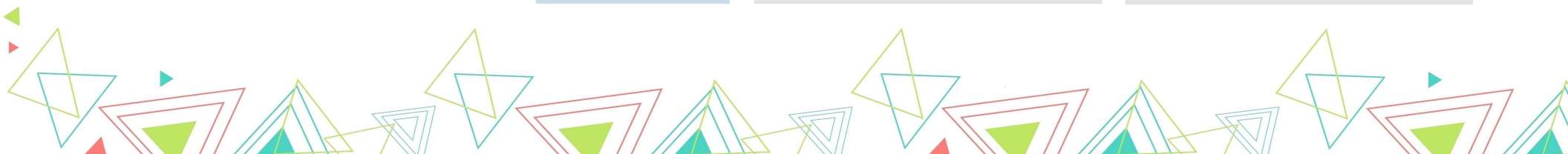

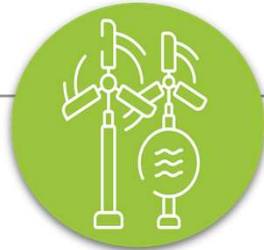

## Where we are with Programme implementation

- **1<sup>st</sup> Open Call for Proposals** – submissions from 12 May 2023 until 4 September 2023
- 98 applications received – 342 Applicants – EUR 80 mil. of EU funds requested
- 25 standard and small scale projects selected and contracted + 2 strategic projects (OSIs)
- Success rate of the 1<sup>st</sup> Call for Proposals - **25.5%** (projects selected/submitted proposals)
- Contracted amount (1<sup>st</sup> Call for Proposals+OSI) – EUR **24,9** mil. of EU funds
- A total of **88** project partners (including LPs) – 44 from Croatia and 44 from Serbia
- High rate of ‘newcomers’ – 41 out of 88 PPs (46%)
- In September 2024 two **implementation workshops** held (in Novi Sad and Osijek)
- Project Implementation Manual and other guidance docs published on Programme website

# Programme Indicators

The impact of the Programme on solving the territorial challenges in the Programme area, is measured through a set of **indicators**:

- **Output indicators** – measuring the direct outcomes of the interventions (*project outputs*)
- **Result indicators** – measuring the lasting effects of the interventions on the targeted area (*project results*)

All Programme indicators have a final target to be reached by the end of 2029.

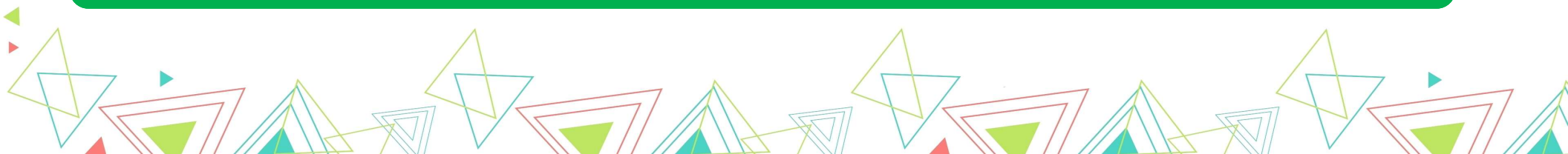
The selection of Programme indicators depends on the Specific Objective targeted by the proposal.

## Important!

Project outputs/results and Programme output/result indicators should have the same measurement unit.

Each project output should have its own **title, description and target value**, even if more than one project output is connected to the same programme output indicator in JEMS system. The description field needs to be clearly and concisely filled-in, since it is limited to 500 characters with spaces (for outputs) and 1.000 (for results).

**NEW in 2021-2027: Programme result indicators** are directly linked to the chosen Programme output indicators, and need to be selected by the project, correctly quantified, monitored and reported on.

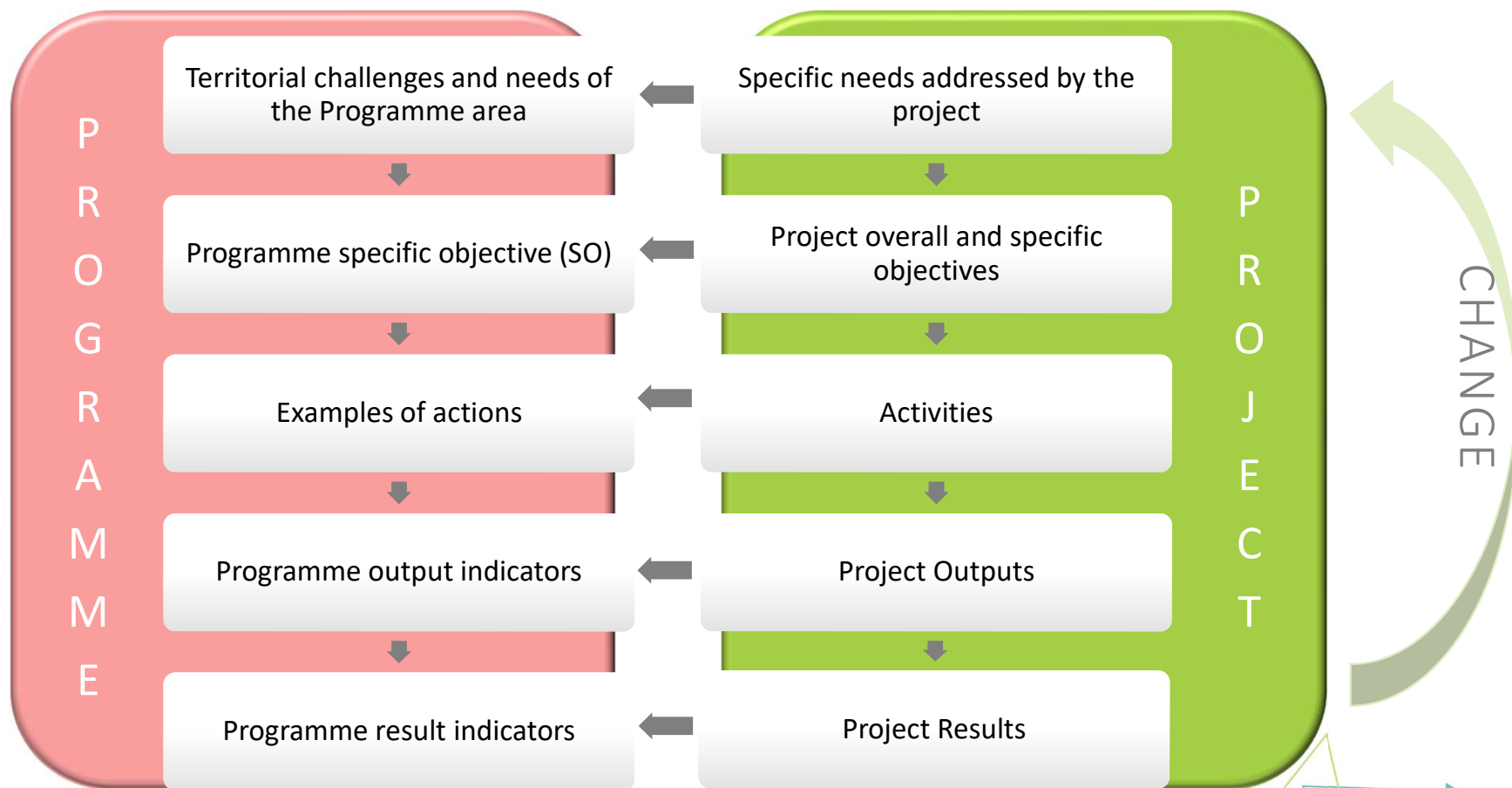

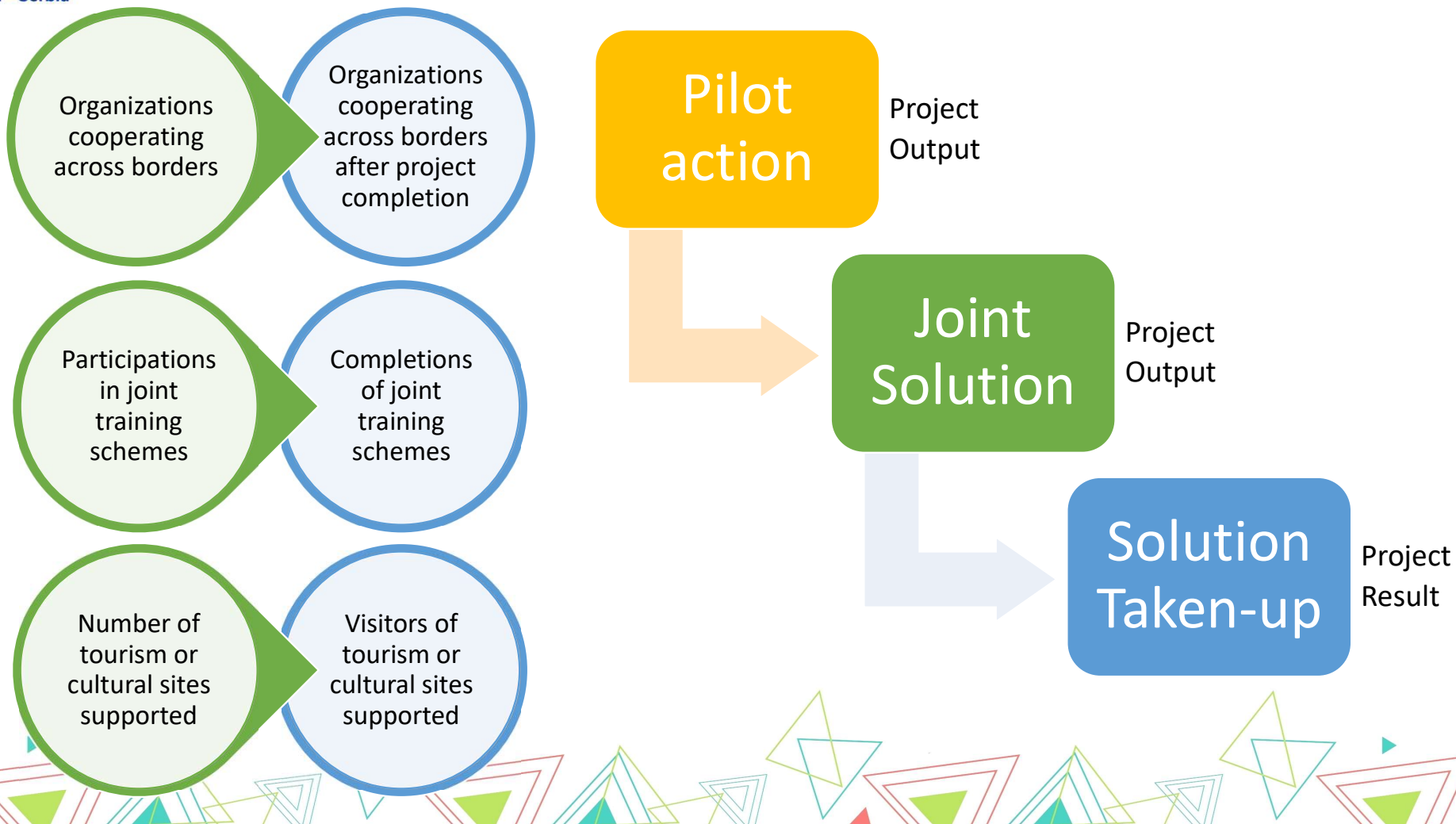
**Important note from the Quality Assessment Grid of the 2nd CFP: If the project does not contribute to the mandatory programme's output/s and/or result/s indicators it will be automatically assessed with NO GO for the Project Intervention Logic, which also means that it will not be further assessed for the Operational Criteria.**

# Definitions of Programme Indicators with examples

## RCO84 Pilot actions developed jointly and implemented in projects (Programme output indicator)

- Measurement unit: pilot action
- Completed by the end of the project
- Aims to test new procedures, instruments or tools in the pilot area OR transferring existing best practices to the pilot area
- Innovative or demonstrative character (novelty for the pilot area)
- Project partners from both countries need to be involved in its development or implementation
- A pilot action should aim towards the development of a **joint solution**

Related Programme Result Indicator: **RCR104 Solutions taken up or up-scaled by organizations**

### Examples of pilot actions

- Testing of biological acceptability and effectiveness of novel carriers for targeted delivery of antitumor drugs
- Applying innovative food processing technology in artisan cheese production in the pilot area
- Pilot rheological testing of blood samples in the cross-border region
- Multi-location field trials and phenotyping of new wheat varieties
- Pilot digitalization of municipality archives in Croatia and Serbia



## RCO116 Jointly developed solutions (Programme output indicator)

- Measurement unit: solution
- Needs to be derived from the pilot action implemented within the project
- Should include indications of actions needed for it to be taken-up or up-scaled by organizations
- Implies the involvement of project partners from both countries in the drafting and design process
- The main focus should not be on administrative or legal frameworks

Related Programme Result Indicator: **RCR104 Solutions taken up or up-scaled by organizations**

### Examples of joint solutions

- Online cross-border platform 'Solar Atlas' presenting data from rooftop analysis of solar energy potentials
- Creation of Micro-scale public solar power efficiency monitoring system in cross-border region
- Joint Curriculum for Operators in Mechatronics, Robotics, and Laser Applications
- Multimedia platform with content for rehabilitation of patients in the cross-border area
- Developed Network of AED devices and equipment for first-aid in cases of sudden cardiac arrest



## RCR104 Solutions taken-up or up-scaled by organizations (Programme result indicator)

- Measurement unit: solution
- Up take = making use of the solution in practice, up-scale = increasing the size or improving its quality
- Jointly developed solution should be taken up or up-scaled during the project or within 1 year after project completion
- By at least 1 organization (within or outside the project partnership)
- Needs to be documented by officially adopting the solution in the strategies/action plans/annual work plans of the institution

### Examples of solutions taken-up

- Platform with digitized archives will be used by the municipalities as a practical tool for archivists, historians, educators, and the public
- Novel system of welding using AI and robotics will be further developed and used by competence centres and research institutes for application in new sectors of industry
- Supporting platform for promotion of green, innovative and sustainable ideas for entrepreneurs will be further developed and improved by civil society organizations
- Newly developed speed breeding method will be further enhanced by the research institutions



## RCO87 Organizations cooperating across borders (Programme output indicator)

- Measurement unit: organizations (only project partners cooperating in the project – LP and PPs)
- Newly established organizations (e.g. clusters) within the scope of the project are not to be counted
- The Programme does not envisage Associated partners, supporting partners without budget, etc.
- No other „tangible” project outputs need to be connected to this output indicator
- We recommend using a standard title/description (such as „X project partners cooperating in the project”)

### Related Programme Result Indicator: **RCR84 Organizations cooperating across borders after project completion**

- The continuation of cooperation among LP/PPs after project completion
- Proven by the formal agreement to be concluded during implementation or within 1 year of project completion
- Cooperation does not have to cover the same topic as the project, but main focus should be stated in Application
- Not all project partners have to continue the cooperation (min. is 2 – but at least 1 partner from each country)

### Examples of the continued cooperation

- Medical institutions will continue the international cooperation on diagnostic methods, treatment and therapeutic strategies for breast cancer patients
- Research institutions will continue the cutting-edge agricultural research with specific emphasis on plant research in the cross-border region

## RCO85 Participations in joint training scheme (Programme output indicator)

- Measurement unit: participants (those who started to attend the joint training scheme)
- The joint (cross-border) element needs to be present – involvement of project partners from both countries is required
- Implies the building of knowledge/skills of participants over several sessions
- A one-off meeting/event/seminar/symposium is not considered as a joint training scheme
- Recording of the successful completions (e.g. through certificates) needs to be ensured

### Related Programme Result Indicator: **RCR81 Completion of joint training scheme**

- Only those participants who successfully completed the training scheme can be counted
- Target value can be lower than the related output (in case not all participants manage to complete the training scheme)
- Documented by the training organizers (either through a record of completions or issuing certificates)
- No previous national certification process of the issuing organization is needed

## Examples of joint training schemes

- Joint training scheme for volunteers in elderly care
- Joint training programme for the application of DNS and Schroth methods in partner hospitals





## RCO77 Number of cultural and tourism sites supported (Programme output indicator)

- Measurement unit: cultural and tourism sites - supported by Programme funding
- Make sure that the site can be considered as a cultural or tourism site, otherwise it cannot be counted
- The project partners need to invest in the cultural/tourism sites, directly through small-scale infrastructure and/or equipment
- Only sites for which the number of visitors can be quantified are to be considered

### Related Programme Result Indicator: **RCR77 Visitors of cultural and tourism sites supported**

- Target = Estimated number of annual visitors of cultural/tourism sites supported, in the first year after project completion
- For existing sites, the baseline value should be the number of visitors in the year before the project starts
- For new sites, the baseline value should be 0
- **Please note that due to technical limitations of the JEMS system, it is always required to enter 0 as the baseline value (even for existing sites, then the calculation of the baseline and target value should be provided in the project result description).**
- Natural sites for which the accurate estimation of the number of visitors is not feasible should not be considered

### Examples of cultural/tourism sites

- New cultural and tourism centers for the promotion of naive art
- Enhanced Cultural and Tourism Experiences at ZOO sites



## Most common mistakes and how to avoid them

- Vague descriptions of project outputs, focused on the measurement units from the previous, 2014-2020 perspective (e.g. MW)
- Cross-border element missing in the development and implementation of project outputs
- Pilot action implemented in e.g. 3 different locations (but same/similar type of activities) counted as 3 pilot actions
- Unquantifiable outputs or difficult for measuring (e.g. enhancement of capacities, improvement of conditions, building knowledge, raising awareness)
- Project outputs overlapping – e.g. the same output considered as both a pilot action and a joint solution
- No clear description on how a joint solution will be taken up or up-scaled by organizations after project completion (in which action plan or institutional plan it will be formally adopted)



## Most common mistakes and how to avoid them

- No mention on the topic of future cooperation of the Organizations (RCR84)
- Counting the institutions who will take-up the solution in the target value instead of the solutions
- Concepts/models, guidelines or strategies counted as a joint solution
- Trainings that cannot be counted as a joint training scheme (either a one-off event or missing the joint element)
- Highly overestimating the target value of participants in joint training scheme (e.g. over 100)
- Counting a site that cannot be considered as a cultural/tourism site (not every investment in a location is a cultural/tourism site by default)
- Unclear method of calculation of baseline and target value for visitors or the inability to count them via tickets, visitor counters etc.



## Practical tips for the project intervention logic

- Make sure that there is a clear logical sequence between a pilot action – joint solution – solution taken up
- A cross-border (joint) element must be present in every project output/result
- Pilot action must represent a real novelty/innovation or demonstration for the pilot area/institution/city involved
- Joint solution should be sustainable even after the end of the project and of real use by the institutions
- Joint training schemes need to build knowledge/skills through several sessions (a training Programme)
- A system to count visitors to cultural/tourism sites should be pre-existing or planned to be installed during project implementation
